FACTS

- Ontario's first Catholic school opened in 1826 (OECTA)
- The right to Catholic education was entrenched in the constitution in 1867 (OECTA)
- There are 1,347 publiclyfunded elementary and secondary Catholic schools in Ontario, serving 562,000 students (Friends and Advocates for Catholic Education)
- Ontario's Catholic ratepayers represent approximately one-third of the province's tax revenue base (OCSTA)

Over the years our Church leaders have taught us a great deal about the importance of publicly-funded Catholic education and its contribution to society. Here are some thoughts to consider as you prepare to vote in the upcoming provincial election on June 2.

THE IMPORTANCE OF CATHOLIC EDUCATION

"Faith and reason are like two wings on which the human spirit rises to the contemplation of truth; and God has placed in the human heart a desire to know the truth – in a word, to know himself – so that, by knowing and loving God, men and women may also come to the fullness of truth about themselves."

"Essential to the fruitfulness of [Ontario's] diverse educational system that is such a benefit to our province is a recognition of the legitimate identity of each partner. As for the Catholic dimension, with which I am most engaged as Cardinal Archbishop of Toronto, that identity is recognized and protected both by section 93 of our Canadian constitution – for without recognition of that identity the agreement that created Canada would not have proceeded – but also by section 1 of the Education Act of Ontario. Both the constitution and the Education Act make it clear that the Catholic identity of the school must be respected."
