A Success Story from the Holy Rosary Parish

In recent months Holy Rosary Parish in midtown Toronto has welcomed refugee families from the Krisan Refugee Camp in Ghana. Nora Mpwankolo arrived at Toronto Pearson Airport on July 11 and

the Monlandjo family, consisting of father Claver, mother Colette, and teenage daughter Essi, arrived on October 3.

About Nora Mpwankolo: Nora was born and raised in Bangui, Central African Republic. She attended primary and secondary school there, as well as university. The Central



African Republic has experienced many years of civil and religious strife. Nora and her family fled after an extremist army faction attacked homes in her area in early 2014. Nora and her parents fled by different routes. After travelling though other countries, Nora found asylum in Ghana, where she had lived until coming to Canada. Sadly, Nora's efforts to find her parents were unsuccessful. In Toronto, Nora continues to move forward with her life. She speaks French, which is the national language of the Central African Republic. She is studying to improve her English and is working full time. Over the past few months, Nora

About the Monlandjo Family: Claver Monlandjo and his wife Colette were both born in Togo. They speak some French and some English. Their mother tongue is Ewe. They too fled because of civil strife in their homeland. Claver went to the Klikor Refugee Camp in Ghana in 1993 and then moved tothe Krisan Refugee Camp in 1997. Colette was in the Krisan Camp at that time. Their daughter Essi was born in 2004.

Claver and Colette are both learning English four days a week. Essi is enrolled in high school in downtown Toronto. She enjoys her studies very much and wants to go to medical school. In the coming months, Holy Rosary Refugee Committee members will be supporting Claver and Colette in their search for long-term employment. The Monlandjos have also been able to enjoy some leisure time, with visits to City Hall and the Eaton Centre, as well as a wonderful day trip to Niagara Falls.

On October the Monlandjos had a unique experience while exploring Toronto's subway system. They were talking to each other in Ewe on a subway platform when a woman approached them and spoke to them in Ewe as well. She too had come to Toronto from Africa. They exchanged contact information.

The Monlandjos and Nora knew each other in the Krisan Camp, so they were delighted to be able to re-connect with each other in Toronto, as well as with other friends who were in the camp and are now living in Toronto.
