

# RELIGIOUS FREEDOM PROTECTING PERSECUTED CHRISTIANS

The Easter Sunday, terrorist attack that targeted Sri Lankan hotels and Catholic churches shocked people from around the world. However, as surprising as it may be for Canadians, Christians and their places of worship are common victims of violence.

Catholics stand with all faith traditions in denouncing religious discrimination and persecution. Pope John Paul II, who witnessed religious persecution first hand in Soviet-controlled Poland, wrote, "Certainly the curtailment of the religious freedom of individuals and communities is not only a painful experience but it is above all an attack on man's very dignity." (*Redemptor Hominis*, No. 17)

- Christians are the victims of 75% of the world's religiously-motivated violence, making Christians the most persecuted religious group on Earth.
- 1,847 churches and other Christian buildings were attacked worldwide in 2018.

#### PROTECTING PERSECUTED CHRISTIANS

Sadly, 327 million Christians live in countries marked by religious persecution. In pure numbers, Christians are the most persecuted religious group on Earth. Some notable examples include:

- More than 2.5 million Christians have been forced from their homes in Iraq and Syria over the past 15 years, putting in doubt the future of some of Christianity's oldest communities.
- Pakistani Christians are considered second-class citizens and are regularly accused of violating anti-blasphemy laws, which carry a death sentence.
- Nigeria has one of the largest Christian populations in the world but the faithful suffer at the hands of armed militants.
- In Laos (just west of Vietnam), only state-approved churches can operate legally and those churches are subject to frequent inspections, parishioners are monitored and Christians have been arrested.

Canadian Christians must defend our religious liberties as well as the freedoms of other faith communities. Earlier this year, the National Assembly of Quebec removed a crucifix that had been present in the assembly since the 1930's and passed Bill 21 which prohibits civil servants from wearing religious symbols while at work (such as crucifixes, turbans and hijabs). The law is more restrictive on Muslims and Sikhs but Catholics should join in solidarity with other faiths when their religious freedom is threatened, just as we should protect our right to express our beliefs publicly without discrimination.
